

Who we are / What we do: Caring Dads is a group intervention program for men who have abused, neglected, or exposed their children to domestic abuse. The program is intended to offer information to men in the program, that if they so choose, can use to father their child(ren) in ways that meet the emotional and development needs of the child. Caring Dads works to complement existing efforts to end men's use of violence, and is intended to be used along with domestic violence or intimate partner violence programs. Caring Dads works in collaboration with other community-based organizations with the goal of addressing men's violence against women. It is critically important that men attend and complete the Catholic Charities Domestic Violence Program for Men as required by the court or agent of the court.

Group sessions are open enrolled, so men can begin the program at any point after completing 5 sessions of DVPM. Who we are / What we do: Provides a variety of specialized protective services to vulnerable adults, ages 18 and older whose condition or circumstances make them vulnerable to abuse, neglect, and exploitation by others. These services are designed to prevent or remedy the neglect, exploitation, or abuse of vulnerable adults by strengthening their capacity to function and be self-directing.

Specialties: Adult protective service, adult residential care homes, home management instruction, homemaker assistance, housekeeping assistance.

Age Range of Clients: Adults 18 years or older.

Eligibility: Adult protection, information, and referrals are available to all persons, regardless of income.

Intake: Any concerned person, family member, friend, neighbor, law enforcement officer, health professional, clergy, or financial institution employee who observes an individual having difficulty in providing for their most basic needs (such as food, clothing, shelter, medical care, or personal safety) is urged to call. Individuals recognizing their own need for assistance should contact as well. All referrals accepted for an adult service assessment are evaluated for Adult Protection eligibility, regardless of the type of assistance requested by the referral source. The process usually begins with a home visit by a caseworker within three business days after receiving the referral. If the situation is considered life threatening, the home visit will be made within 24 hours.

Who we are / What we do: "Harambee House is a residential facility that provides single-occupancy, permanent housing to chronically homeless mentally-ill individuals eighteen years of age and over. The program was developed through HUD funding as a safe haven project, and adheres to the housing first model in encouraging and assisting homeless, mentally-ill individuals to come in off of the streets. Harambee House is a low-demand environment that focuses on providing residential stability without requiring pre-admission adherence to treatment modalities or abstinence from substance use."

Services: "The Harambee House Program serves sixteen homeless men and women who are living with severe and persistent mental illness or co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders. These individuals have historically been untreated for many years and are often unwilling or unable to participate in supportive services. The complexity of their needs include chronic medical health conditions and psychiatric needs with untreated mental illness. Harambee House provides a low demand, trauma-informed, culturally sensitive and non-intrusive environment and does not require participation in treatment or sobriety as condition for housing. Harambee House utilizes a "Housing First" community model which does not require clean time, medication compliance or linkage to treatment for acceptance to the residence. The only request is a willingness to come indoors from the streets. This model is accepted as a best practice by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and is utilized all over the United States."

Specialties: Harambee House is a 24-hour residence with on-site case management where tenants can reside for an unlimited period of time. Staff assists tenants to transition from the streets in a safe and caring, client-centered and trauma-informed manner. Harambee House provides a relaxed environment where they are treated with dignity and respect that encourages the tenants to feel at home. Every consideration is made to allow each tenant to transition at his or her own pace. Staff conduct assessments for independent living skills and provide assistance and training that is tailored to each

person's needs. Vocational services are available on and off site. Outreach teams are available to provide support and community linkage assistance as needed. Trips to community and sports events are planned regularly. Birthdays and graduations to permanent housing are celebrated with a special dinner and congratulations by other residents and staff. Other services include secure mail, access to local phone calls, laundry facilities, computer access, two meals daily, transportation to and from scheduled appointments and medical and mental health assistance.

Important Information: All participants access the Harambee House program through the ECDOMH SPOA Housing office and our local CoC Coordinated Entry process. A VI-SPDAT vulnerability assessment (evidence based tool) is performed by Coordinated Entry prior to referral. Once the SPOA referral is received by this agency, staff meets with the prospective participant within 48 hours to complete a comprehensive intake assessment and determine eligibility. Documentation verifying homelessness, mental health diagnosis and income source are requested and secured. If the participant is not eligible, or there are no available openings, Coordinated Entry and SPOA are notified. If the participant is eligible, they are immediately moved into the house and the engagement process begins.

Eligibility: Applicant must have a severe and persistent mental illness with an axis I diagnosis. Applicant must have significant history of homelessness and meet the HUD definition of chronic homeless. (If all chronic homeless individuals on the Coordinated Entry list are linked with housing, Coordinated Entry will refer the next most vulnerable individual.) Applicant must have been unsuccessful in other housing programs and/or be appropriate for the level of care provided by the Harambee House.

Refugees considered for resettlement by the United States must pass through a series of security screenings aimed at ensuring they will not pose a security risk. The information examined to confirm a refugee's identity is checked against law enforcement, the intelligence community, and other relevant databases, including those administered by the National Counterterrorism Center, Department of Defense, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Department of State, and Department of Homeland Security. If there is doubt about whether an applicant poses a security threat, the individual will not be admitted to the U.S.


